Our vision for Ireland is one of biodiverse ecosystems and thriving livelihoods, woven by culturally vibrant Irish fibres.

As an organisation that works accross all links of the textile value chain, our members include fibre & dye growers, fibre processors & manufacturers, crafters, designers, brands, retailers, researchers, educators, consumers and general supporters of our vision.

We work to provide our members with networking opportunities, better access to regenerative Irish-grown fibres & dyes and opportunities for fibre processing. We also engage in research, advocacy and policy change.



Reciprocal Textiles Programme A growing group of fibre and dye farmers interested in or already implementing regenerative land management practices. The aim of this member-led group is to transfer knowledge around 8 key topics:

- **Biodiversity**
- Habitat restoration
- Water catchment restoration
- Natural ways to increase productivity in the farm
- Local farming wisdom
- Cultural heritage
- **Community networks**
- **Producer/consumer relationships**

As a result of these sessions, we are collaboratively developing a verification system for Irish textiles grown following agroecological principles, inspired by Fibershed's Climate Beneficial<sup>™</sup> programme in the USA.

This legal structure ensures that all profits made by the organisation are reinvested in the company. It also opens doors for bigger funding opportunities.





## Reciprocal Textiles Fibre & Yarn

- We're in the process of getting 120kg
   of wool from 2 of our Reciprocal
   Programme partgicipants processed
   into scoured fibre, batting and yarn.
- It's being processed in Portugal, but we hope that future versions will have a fully-Irish value chain.
- Sales from this yarn will help fund our Reciprocal Textiles Programme.
- We aim to repeat this project and improve the quality of the fibre every year.





## 'Woven from our Soil' collaborative tapestry

During the Earth Rising Eco Art Festival at IMMA, we offered drop-in demonstrations about spinning, weaving and natural dyeing using Irish-grown materials. Participants were also invited to learn more about the potential of Irish-grown biofibres and contribute to a collaborative woven tapestry to be displayed in future events and exhibitions.
